In this course, it will be argued that biblical theology is essentially missional theology because it is rooted in the being and nature of the triune God revealed in the person and work of Jesus Christ and His Spirit. After a preliminary discussion of the role of pastors as church theologians, we will investigate, in turn, the missional dimensions of theology proper, soteriology, and ecclesiology. In the process, we hope to illuminate these subjects in new and personally transforming ways, for both the students and the churches they serve.
